### GINTER, CLARA HERITAGE

MRS. GINTER DEAD. Passes Away at Her Home Here Friday---Services a M. E. Church. Clara Heritage Ginter, wife of F. L. Ginter, aged 34 years, died at her home on P street, Friday morning, February 27<sup>th</sup>, at 12:05 o'clock, from pulmonary complications. Mrs. Ginter was born in Middleport, Ohio, September 16, 1880. She was married to Frederick Leslie Ginter, August 27, 1902, in Cincinnati, Ohio. Mr. and Mrs. Ginter came to Arizona in 1906, making their home in Tucson. In 1911 they came to Safford, where they established themselves in a beautiful home, Mr. Ginter having organized the Gila Valley Milling Co., and became its manager. Mrs. Ginter suffered for years from pulmonary troubles, which she bore patiently. She was a very devoted daughter and practically sacrificed her life in caring for her mother, who has been an invalid for some time, giving her all her attention day and night and when she was suffering herself. Mrs. Ginter was of noble character, a firm Christian, a good friend and neighbor, a loving mother and a devoted wife. Mrs. Ginter is survived by her husband and little daughter, Ulah, her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Heritage, and a sister, Mrs. Stanley Bezanson, who resides in Belleville, Ky., and two brothers, Herbert, of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Harry, of Allegheny Pa. The funeral services were held Saturday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock, at the M. E. Church. Rev. C. C. Rickman was in charge and conducted the services, assisted by the choir. The Church was crowded with people from all parts of the valley. Following Dr. Rickman, President Andrew Kimball delivered a beautiful eulogy of the deceased and spoke feelingly of the friendship existing between the deceased and his family. During the services the choir sang "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" and "Asleep in Jesus." "Abide with Me," was sung as a duet by Mrs. E. W. Clayton and Mrs. George S. Martin. Mrs. Harell accompanied on the organ. The casket was covered with many beautiful floral offerings by friends. During the services the business houses of the town were closed. The interment was made in Union cemetery after short services at the grave.

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### GRIJALVA, MARIJALDA

An old time scout of this State died at his home near Solomonville last Thursday, none other than Marijalda Grijalva. He was born in Mexico. When 12 years of age he was captured and brought into southern Arizona by

a band of maurauding (sic) Apaches, who used to make frequent raids into the isolated districts of Sonora. After being in captivity for seven years, he escaped and fled to Las Cruces, N. M. where he remained until the close of the Civil War. He returned to Arizona with Bennett's column acting as a guide. At one time he was chief scout at Fort Grant. He was 70 years of age at the time of his death.

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**GRINDER, WILLIAM H., JR.**

DEATH OF W. H. GIRDER. Passes Away Suddenly at His Home Early Monday Morning. William H. Grider, Jr., died at his home, corner of Twelfth and M streets, Monday morning, November 24<sup>th</sup>, about four o'clock. Mr. Grider had been a sufferer for many years from tuberculosis and his end came so peacefully that it was a shock to his family and friends. The funeral took place Tuesday morning. Impressive services were held at the M. E. Church, Rev. C. C. Rickman officiating. The music was furnished by a quartet, Messrs. Swift, Claydon, Young and Paxton, accompanied on the organ by Mrs. Hart D. Empie. The interment was made in the Union cemetery. William H. Grider was born in Memphis, Tenn., April 24, 1861, and was the oldest son of William H. Grider. He was engaged in the banking business for years in his native city. He first came to Arizona in 1903, and was employed in the Gila Valley Bank and Trust Co., at Clifton, until he left for Waco, Texas, where he lived for several years with his father and sister, returning here about five years ago. He is survived by his father, two brothers, Maury and Edward, and three sisters, Mrs. Bruce and Mrs. Joyner, of Memphis, Tenn., and Miss Norma.

**GREEN, ELISHA T.**

DEATH OF ELISHA T. GREEN. Passes Away at His Home in Thatcher after Short Illness. Elisha T. Green died Thursday evening, February 5<sup>th</sup>, after an illness of several weeks. A sad feature of his death was that his wife was back in Kansas at the bedside of her mother, who was very sick. Mr. Green was born in Virginia in 1856 and lived there until he came to Arizona, about nine years ago. His first wife died about five years ago and he married again about a year and a half ago. He leaves four children: Claud, who is married and living in Virginia; Jesse, married, at Thatcher; Overta, the wife of Emer Plumb, lives at Eden, and Macy. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, as follows: "I Need Thee Every Hour," by the choir. Prayer. "O Grave, where is Thy Victory," by the choir. J. H. Lines told of visiting Mr. Green at his Virginia home. George H. Crosby, jr., gave a biographical sketch. A. C. Peterson spoke on the resurrection. All paid high tribute to the character of the deceased. Singing, "O My Father," by the choir.

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**GREEN, NOAH**

At 2 o'clock on the morning of Jan. 16, 1904, Noah Green passed quietly away at his home in Solomonville. He had been sick about two weeks with catarrh of the stomach. The funeral was held at the residence on Saturday afternoon under the auspices of the Masons, Mr. Green having been a member of this order for fifty years. After the funeral services the remains were taken by stage to Coronado and from there shipped to his old home in Illinois, accompanied by his son, Luther. At Coronado a delegation of Masons and Knights of Pythias from Clifton met the remains, some of whom went as far as El Paso. Noah Green was born in Johnston, Ohio, July 22, 1822. Went to Illinois in 1849. From Illinois he went to Colorado in 1880 and in 1883 came to Arizona. His wife died in 1883. The remains of Mr. Green will be buried beside her. He leaves four children, Susan Cochran, 58 years old; D. M. Green; 56 years old; Margaret Melendy, 53 years (sic) old, and Luther, the youngest. The daughters reside in Illinois. Ever since coming to Arizona, Mr. Green has conducted a livery stable at Solomonville and also run the Solomonville and Clifton stage line, and has always been one of progressive and pushing business men of the county, honored and respected by all who knew him, and while

his relatives and friends mourn his loss, they have the consolation of knowing that the world is better because he has lived in it.

### **GUSOSKY, FRED**

Died, Friday evening last, Fred Gusosky, aged 49 years. Deceased came to Clifton three weeks ago with his wife and son, hoping that a change of climate would be beneficial to his health. He had been a sufferer from dropsy for the past year or more, and arrived in a critical condition. From the time of this arrival it was seen that there was no hope for his recovery, hence his death was not a surprise, and came rather as a relief to his months of suffering. Deceased was an old timer in the southwest, having arrived at Silver city in the early '80s, where he became connected with the mercantile establishment of M. W. Neff & Co., where he remained for many years. He was married to Miss Hallie Neff, the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Neff, about fifteen years ago, who survives him, together with a son, aged fourteen years. Deceased was a man of ability and energy, a kind husband and a good citizen. The funeral was conducted from the Pascoe undertaking parlors on Saturday last, the remains being followed to the grave by a large number of friends, as well as the sorrowing relatives, who have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement.

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### **GUZMAN, JUAN**

Killed by Lightning. Last Tuesday evening at about 4 o'clock in Solomonville, a few steps from the house of Jesus Aceveda, a stroke of lightning killed an old man named Juan Guzman and his horse. Mart Taylor was about 40 or 50 steps away from the unfortunate man at the time of his death and was somewhat dazed by the concussion but not injured. The thunderbolt struck the man on the side of the head, descending down the right side of the body to the ground, blistering the body from head to foot, and tearing the clothing to shreds. The right shoe was torn almost to pieces. The man was tying his horse to a small tree at the time and fell a single instant before the horse. There was no mark discernable upon the horse, but the death of the man and horse was certainly instantaneous. An inquest was held and verdict rendered in accordance with the above facts. Deceased lived on a ranch of Antony Kambitch, was about 60 years of age and leaves a wife.

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
